The Power of Reading!

 Creating a love of reading in children is potentially one of the most powerful ways of improving academic standards in school. There can be few better ways to improve pupils chances in school, or beyond in the wider world than to enable them to become truly independent readers.

Reading

- Success in reading is fundamental to success in school
- Reading is all about acquiring meaning, for enjoyment, information and understanding
- Most aspects of the curriculum rely upon reading as a skill
- If children enjoy reading, they are more likely to do well

Reading in School The *Teaching* of Reading

- Phonics
- Shared reading
- Guided reading
- Independent reading
- Focused reading activities (Comprehension)
- Reading linked to topic
- Partnered reading
- Reading across the curriculum
- Class novels and stories (Power of Reading)

Guided Reading

- Teacher will work with a group of children once a week this may involve listening to children read, discussing a text, sharing ideas and views – developing children's understanding of the book through inference and deduction
- The rest of the class will be completing activities based on the book that they are reading or SPAG (Spelling, Grammar & Punctuation)
- Years 5 & 6 are trialling a shared reading approach –
 where the class share a text, analysis the text and discuss
 questions & features etc

What you can do! Reading at Home - Enjoy!

- Make reading visible; have books available in your home
- Share books every day
- Model reading for boys: boys need to see that reading is a positive thing to do!
- Talk about books
- Sit and listen
- Respect choices
- Pause the TV and discuss what is happening predict what will happen next

What you can do if your child is stuck


- Use phonics first. What sound does the word begin with?
 Can you say the sounds in the word? Blend them together.
- If the child doesn't know the word tell them the word and what it means.
- Read to the end of the sentence. What would make sense?
- What is the text about what might fit here?
- Does it sound right?
- If there are images, look at the picture. Does it help?



Talk about what they are reading

- Do you like this book; why?
- Who is your favourite character?
- Tell me about a character in the book...
- Which words tell you what the character is like?
- How would you feel?
- What do you think will happen next?
- What would you do?
- What have you learned about ...in your book?
- What can you tell me about...?

Understanding (Comprehension)



- Finding information on the page
- Being able to find information that is not on the page Looking for clues (inference)
- Thinking about situations and predicting what might happen
- Putting yourself in a character's shoes and understanding what is going on from their viewpoint
- Provide a summary of what has just been read

Hearing your child read

- Choose a quiet time and give your child your full attention;
- Give support if required using the strategies explained earlier;
- Explain the meaning of new words;
- Talk about the text using open questions.
- Please sign the reading diary!



Reading to your children

- Introduce your children to different types of books;
 classic fiction, chapter books, short stories, joke books,
 poetry, non-fiction
- Read them the book that was your favourite when you were a child
- Read slowly, with expression. Try to use different and funny voices for characters. They will love it!
- Follow the words and read the story using the pictures
- Talk about what is happening and what might happen next. Leave the story on a cliffhanger!

KS 1 & KS2 Reading Test

- In KS1 and KS2 reading test there is a big focus on vocabulary
- Text and word level is a lot higher than previously nationally children found the vocabulary and length of the text challenging.
- We need to change this......

How to achieve this....

- Read more
- Read newspapers child friendly!
- Watch Newsround
- Use alternative words
- Discuss language
- Use of dictionaries and thesaurus

Reading Scheme....


- All children follow a reading program
- All books are colour coded according from pink to dark red
- Children are assessed and new levels/book bands given accordingly

Reading Scheme....

- At home you may feel that children can read their book with 'ease'. Children will be able to decode (read) the words within the book, with some challenging vocabulary.
- What is more important is whether they understand what is being read. Use questions to develop/check this.
- Be reassured that the class teacher, will assess and evaluate whether a child needs to move up to the next level.
- The children will also be able to have a book of their choice – 'Free Choice'.

Reading Passports

- Let's promote reading together!
- Author focus for each Year group
- Challenge a list of books to read throughout the year!
- Questions that you can use to help develop your child's reading comprehension






